






THE NIGHT OF SCIENCES 2025 LOUIS BRAILLE: 200 YEARS OF HERITAGE













SPEAKERS





Hélène Jousse is a French sculptor and author, widely recognized for her "ribbon-face" sculptures, which have been exhibited in museums around the world. She has also written four books, including "The Hands of Louis Braille", a novel that delves into the life of Louis Braille and his invention of a writing system for the blind and visually impaired. Hélène Jousse is deeply committed to making art more accessible and inclusive.

Hisayo Katsui is a Professor in Disability Studies at the University of Helsinki. Her research focuses on disability rights and inclusion across global contexts, with studies conducted in Ethiopia, Nepal, Uganda, and Finland. Hisayo Katsui has worked for the Finnish Society for Disability Research and for the United Nations Special Rapporteur on Disability.

Tiina Boegman is a master's student in archaeology. Her studies focus on Holocaust archaeology, the digitalisation of cultural heritage, folklore and museology.

Susanna Halme is a master's student in Finnish language at the University of Helsinki. Her master's thesis focuses on the attitudes and experiences of visually impaired persons regarding braille.

"The Blind", from his real name Jean-Charles Souliman, is a French artist specialized in Braille graffiti. Despite having full vision, he uses Braille to create tactile art accessible to visually impaired persons. Since 2004, he has set up installlations in various cities around the world, fostering a unique interaction between sighted and non-sighted persons.
